The Ambulatory Emergency Care Service aimed to:

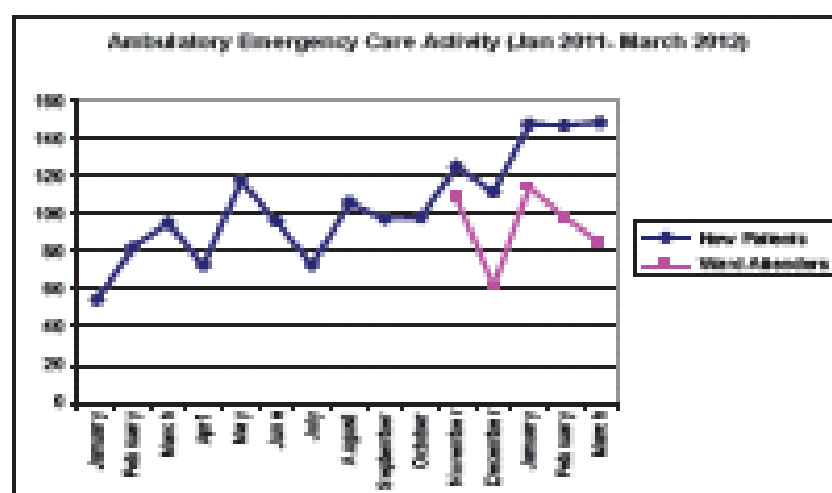
- reduce avoidable emergency admission to hospital

Improvement so far

- Reduction in emergency admissions
- Low readmission rate
- Reducing emergency readmission
- Financial savings to commissioners
- Improved patient experience

Challenges

- Reducing inappropriate referral
- Ring-fencing beds
- Impact of 'direct referral' ambulatory on A&E CQI 1 performance
- Development of local tariff

- Dedicated accommodation
- Incremental roll out of pathways continues
- Integration with community urgent care services
- Development of dedicated medical support
